Judy belongs to many lineage and patriotic societies and is an officer in many of them. They were closely followed by the descendants of William Brewster at 8.

NECROLOGY. Myrna Geldart. There were three deaths this year in our Society. Ronald Addeman Baker, George Walter Gilbert and Frederick Russell Abraham.

GOVERNOR'S REPORT. Joyce Cutler. 2010 marks the 30th anniversary of the Canadian Society of Mayflower Descendants. We are already making plans as to how to celebrate this momentous occasion and would welcome any ideas or suggestions from our membership as to what they would like us to do.

She then read the acknowledgment to Joyce that appeared in her latest book. She went on to say:

"Our society has benefited from Joyce's dedication and hard work. She takes on jobs when there is no one else to do it such as the Treasurer's job when she was already Governor and Librarian. She keeps things running smoothly and I envy her organizational skills which must be the teacher in her. 

Inauguration Visit to Washington DC

he following is an account from member Teri Aboud who attended the Canadian Embassy's "Tailgate Party" in Washington, DC, for the inauguration of the new American President.

Well that was quite a day!

Mark and I flew in and out of Washington yesterday (January 20) for the inauguration, which in itself was a miracle with 2 million people descending on DC all at once. The logistics worked out perfectly.

We arrived at the Canadian Embassy courtyard just in time to see Obama get sworn in on the jumbotron TV that they had set up. I'm pretty sure the ground vibrated with the applause when Obama finished! It was pretty special.

There was security absolutely EVERY-WHERE. On rooftops and 3 bodies deep on some of the streets. I sometimes thought there was more security than there were spectators! Subways were packed to the point of claustrophobia but everyone was really friendly and just

really friendly and just happy to be a part of this amazing day.

I can honestly say Mark and I froze our butts off!! Who knew it was going to be that cold...I should have worn my fur coat against the wishes of my husband! The embassy had a great set up on the outside, second floor patio, with warming towers and lots of great food and drink. 
Joan has been a dedicated contributor to the BC Colony of the Canadian Society of May-

The Pilgrims and Plymouth Colony: 1620

ou can find hundreds of Web sites devoted to the topics of Pilgrims, Plymouth Colony, and the voyage of the Mayflower in 1620. I cannot say that I have seen all of these sites, but of those that I have seen, I must say that I am most impressed by Duane A. Cline's "The Pilgrims and Plymouth Colony: 1620."

Cline's pages are an educator's tool: he describes the events leading up to the 1620 voyage of the *Mayflower*, provides information about the ships (there were two ships although the Speedwell had to turn back early in its voyage), storms at sea, animals on board, arrival in the new lands, the Mayflower Compact, meetings with the Indians, the rocky merging of the two cultures, the first winter when about half the settlers died, the first Thanksgiving, the starvation of 1622, and much more. Best of all for genealogists, Cline gives a detailed list of all the known passengers on board the Mayflower and brief biographies of each.

The information on "The Pilgrims and Plymouth Colony: 1620" is divided into lesson plans. This agenda is good for learning and is excellent for any teacher who is planning to present this information in a classroom. Because of the wealth of information available, nearly 100 links (and sub-links) point to various bits of information on this Web site and to other sites as well. In addition, there are nearly 90 images/pictures, mostly original artwork from Duane Cline.

Duane A. Cline is well qualified in this topic. He received his M.A. degree in Speech and Theater from Northwestern University. Over the years, he has written, designed, and directed a great many theatrical productions and historical pageants in his capacity as a university professor, head of theater department, and founding director of a regional art center. In addition, he has written two books: *Navigation in the Age of Discovery: an Introduction*, and *Centennial History: General Society of Mayflower Descendants*. He has twice been invited to serve as a Guest Curator at Pilgrim Hall in Plymouth, Massachusetts.

When he learned that both he and his wife, Carolyn, were descendants of Mayflower passengers, he became affiliated with the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Through the years, he has served that organization in many capacities on both state and national levels. Most notably, he is a Former Assistant Governor General of the national Society and has served a number of years at its Education Chair.

Over the years, thousands of families have been told that "our ancestors came over on the Mayflower." Indeed, if all the people who were reported to be on board had actually been there, the *Mayflower* would have been the size of the *Queen Mary*!

Ellinor Billington Interview



Ilinor Billington sailed on the Mayflower in 1620 with her husband John and their sons, John and Francis. Her husband was hanged in 1638 for the murder of John Newcomen. He had been in trouble with the Plymouth authorities before, particularly for supporting a revolt against Governor Bradford. Their son John died before his father, but Fran-

cis lived a long life and is said to have had eight children. Ellinor remarried, to Gregory Armstrong, in 1638.

What was day-to-day life like on Plymouth Plantation in the 1620s?

Well, upon our first arrival it were quite difficult. My family, God were with us. We were the only family that were not afflicted with any great troubles. None of my family were greatly sickened. But all other families did lose of some relatives during the time. So the first few months were quite difficult. The menfolk were getting off of the ship and going down and cutting of the trees in order to build some housing for us. We lived upon the vessel for some three or four months after we arrived before we could even live within any kind of a dwelling at all. And that one dwelling that were built the first, the first time, turned into such that we were all taken of the sick folk in there. And those of us that were of goodly health were taking care of the sick folk. But after springtime and the turn of the year, we found we were feeling somewhat better, and we buried of our dead, and praised God that there were as many of us alive as there were dead. For other colonies had not come to that, the Lord had not seen to shine upon them as he did with us. So we were able to bring ourselves about and come and start to plant of our corn. One of them Injuns, Squanto was his name, he did even show the menfolk when to plant the corn and how to plant it with fish in the hills. And it was somewhat greatly affected we were by the, by the welcoming and the goodliness of them folk. And then we just kept to ourselves to some sturdy work and managed after the first year to feel that we were on a path to, to a goodly place here in this new world.
