The Minutes of our last meeting which were published in our Newsletter (volume 30, #1) were approved unanimously.

THE MAYFLOWER COMPACT was read by George McNeillie. George has been nominated for the position of Captain.

ANCESTRAL ROLL CALL Read by Debbie Clarke. This year Debbie included the names of all the men, women and children who left descendants. We had representatives from 31 Mayflower families present with us today. The descendants of William Brewster were in first place, having 6 members present. The families of John Billington, Henry Sampson, Elinor Billington, and Mary Allerton followed close behind each having four members present.

GOVERNOR`S REPORT Joyce Cutler. Joyce explained that we had changed the date of our Annual Meeting and Compact Luncheon to October 22 from November for two reasons. October 22 falls before the end of

She has already been busy conducting business with the Executive and learning the ropes, and there is much to learn.

The Canadian Society was well represented at Congress by a delegation of 6. Susan said she would again like to thank our delegates for attending: our Treasurer Lynne Webb, George Nye of Alberta, Gordon Wood of Nova Scotia and Sandy Fairbanks of Nova Scotia. Marion and Cyndee were also in Plymouth and joined us for the closing banquet. The next Triennial Congress is in September 2014. In addition to the two days of



business meetings the Society plans many activities, including a church service at Plimoth Plantation; an opportunity to dress in Pilgrim costume and join the Pilgrim Progress thru town to the church where opening

ceremonies are held; a garden reception at the Mayflower House; meetings of the various family societies and a banquet. In addition to all this, several day tours to historic areas are also offered. If you think you might like to join us as a delegate in 2014, please let Susan know. While in Plymouth they attended the brick laying ceremony in the gardens of the Mayflower Society House. She would encourage you to donate the \$150 for a brick inscribed with your name and ancestor. It is quite

Susan was elected Historian in 1993 and has enjoyed the work immensely these past 18 years. But, she thinks the time has come to pass the job on to another. When her term expires next fall, Susan would like to step down as Historian. However, she would consider staying on as Co-Historian if we could find someone to take on half the workload. We will begin advertising in the spring newsletter, however if anyone here thinks they may be interested and would like more information, please contact her.

Susan said she would like to thank her Assistant, Connie Bryce who helps her with applicants' worksheets. The Historian General's office requires the information on applications to be formatted in a specific concise way, using certain abbreviations in a consistent man-

ner. What she receives from applicants, however, is sometimes anything but. Susan emails the worksheet to Connie and she performs the time consuming job of transforming the data into the proper format. This is a

big help to her as it frees up her time to work with applicants.

We had a new member with us, Anne Wright. Susan called Anne up to the podium, presented her with her membership certificate and welcomed her into the Society.

SECRETARY'S RE-PORT Debbie Clarke. No report.

TREASURER'S RE-

We have a total of 264 members; 114 of whom are regular members; and 60 are life members. Of the regular members, 64 have already paid their dues for 2012. \$40,000 worth of GIC's purchased in 2008 have now matured. Last

year they earned 8% interest. Lynne explained that she has invested our money in the following manner. Since there is no way we can possibly ever hope to get 8% interest again, Lynne decided to put \$10,000 in a 5 year GIC tied to the market. This new type of GIC has the potential to give us 20% interest, depending on what the market does. If the market goes up we will make money. However, if in the worst case scenario the market goes down, we are guaranteed that we will not lose any of our principle. Lynne put another \$10,000 in a 5 year GIC tied to utilities under the same type of arrangement.

LIBRARIAN REPORT Myrna Geldart. Myrna thanked Joyce for introducing her to the staff at the North York Public Library where our collection is held. She reminded us that the Librarians will do a limited search for people. Myrna then indicated a table where some Old Quarterlies were piled and invited people to take



any one of them they wanted.

REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE Susan Roser (chairman), Mary Nichols and Elizabeth Larrabee.

Rec. Secretary- Debbie Clarke; Correspondence Secretary- Brent Rutherford. (Brent has volunteered to assume the duties of membership chair. He will also send letters to nudge the memories of people who have contacted us but who have not proceeded any farther.);

Surgeon-Dr. George Nye; Captain- George McNeillie; and Elder- Bob White.

There were no nominations from the floor.

The above report of the Nominating Committee was accepted, and passed unanimously on a motion by Susan Roser seconded by Connie Bryce.

The business part of the meeting now concluded, Joyce asked Bob White to lead us in saying Grace.

Joyce then asked Keith Bain to start off our luncheon with a toast to the Queen. At the conclusion of our meal we held a Raffle.

A PILGRIM'S PROGRESS REPORT : How I discovered my Mayflower Ancestry by George G. McNeillie, III DE PEA PILORITA

The arms granted to George McNeillie by the Canadian Heraldic Authority in 2011.

M any people who have not been bitten by the genealogy bug think of it as being largely an exercise in snobbery, an attempt to gain prestige from the accomplishments of others. That was certainly, at least to some extent, true in the nineteenth century, the Golden Age of the nouveau riche. But today precious little prestige flows from one's ancestors, however exalted, rich, or powerful they may have been."

"That is not to say, however, that finding an ancestor of great prominence is not fun. It certainly is. But it's a bit like golf. While no one plays the game to hit a hole in one, any golfer who happens to do so is going to talk about it quite a lot. And in genealogy, a triple bogey is

the same as a hole in one, in the sense that a great scoundrel is quite as good as a great hero."

Five years ago, I wrote a piece on genealogy for The Globe and Mail that outlined how I became interested in researching my family tree:

"We are the vehicles in which our ancestors ride,' my father used to intone sententiously at the dinner table,

after spotting some trait in his children that had been a hallmark of earlier generations.

"I had largely dismissed the maxim, until my own children arrived on the scene and began (eerily) to display characteristics of various aunts, uncles and grandparents. This might have driven the scientifically minded into a study of genetics. However, lacking the science gene, I chose instead to research my family tree."

"Courtesy of a greatgrandfather and an uncle who had laboriously catalogued my father's side of the family, I began casually sifting through family history when I was a teenager, but I didn't really get bitten by the genealogy bug until (if you'll pardon the pun) relatively recently."

Like most Baby Boomers I

had grown up with the history and myths of Plymouth Rock and the Pilgrim Fathers (and let's not forget the Pilgrim Mothers – who have their own monument!). I thought the Pilgrims were somehow more of an 'American' tradition. And, I had absolutely no idea that I was actually descended from four Mayflower passengers (and was related to four others) – and the discovery was made quite by accident.

In 2007, I was meandering down the maternal family line of my paternal great-grandmother, Julia Raymond, on Ancestry.com and I followed it back to John and Joan Tilley, their daughter Elizabeth and her husband John Howland. Ancestry.com does not guarantee the validity of the research on their site, but the work



other people had done before me in 'connecting the dots' was immensely helpful to my research.

I found, to my surprise and delight, that there was a Canadian Society of Mayflower Descendants, and I set about to make my application. I had just successfully completed an application to register one of my ancestors as a United Empire Loyalist, so I felt confident as a researcher.

One of the first people I met was Susan Roser, now the Deputy Governor/Historian of CSMD and Secretary General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Susan, as we all know, is a prolific and distinguished *Mayflower* chronicler. Based on my Globe article, she kindly invited me to make a presentation to the CSMD's Annual Meeting in November 2007. The topic I chose was entitled 'Kings and Horse Thieves' – since many of us have both in our family trees.

Susan also encouraged me to attend subsequent CSMD meetings and provided invaluable assistance and suggestions as I researched my Mayflower ancestors. I finally received my certificate for John Tilley on December 20, 2010 – three years after I had embarked upon my research! I chose Tilley (who along with his wife, brother Edward and sister-in-law Ann died that first winter in Plymouth), rather than his more famous son-in-law John Howland, because I wanted to commemorate his courage and sacrifice.

Around the same time, I had been petitioning for a grant of a coat of arms from the Canadian Heraldic Authority, an office of the Governor-General of Canada. Heraldry had been an interest of mine since boyhood, and I learned that, while some members of my family had their own personal arms, I was not entitled to bear any of them. Thanks to my discovery of Mayflower ancestors, I was able to incorporate my Pilgrim heritage into the design of my arms.

The crest is described as in heraldic terminology as follows: "Issuant from a Loyalist civil coronet Or [gold], a dexter cubit arm vested Sable [black] cuffed Argent [white], the hand proper holding a mullet Argent [white star]; And for a Motto: TO BE A PILGRIM." [The motto was taken from John Bunyan's hymn 'He Who Would Valiant Be' from his book A Pilgrim's Progress].

Although I have since learned that it was more likely that the Puritans (from whom I am also descended) not the Pilgrims, wore black clothes, I believe I have still managed to find a unique way to commemorate my *Mayflower* heritage!





One of my duties as Captain will be to help develop a public relations program for CSMD. Having spent the majority of my career in the PR field, this is familiar territory for me, and my task will be to work with the Board – and with interested members in our branches -- to help raise the profile of our organization.

Our objectives are:

- To heighten awareness for and interest in— the CSMD;
- To educate Canadians about the important role the Pilgrims played in our own history; and
- To lay the groundwork for planned 400th Anniversary Celebrations of the Pilgrim Landings in 2020

Our PR activities will be aimed at helping to grow our membership by educating Canadians about the importance of the *Mayflower* to our modern concepts of religious tolerance and democratic expression, and to show them how they can research their *Mayflower* ancestors. While we will be discussing these matters in more detail at our upcoming Board meeting in April, I wanted to briefly share with you some of the ideas we are considering:

- Establishing a social media presence for the Canadian Society of Mayflower Descendants specifically a Facebook fan page and a Twitter site. In our digital age, social media has become a primary means for organizations to communicate with members and those who may be interested in joining. Social media can help open up our communications to thousands of people.
- Investigating an application for a grant of arms and a badge from the Canadian Heraldic Authority (an office of the Governor-General of Canada). Arms are considered to be honours from the Crown, and as such they not only confer dignity upon an individual or organization but they could also provide CSMD with a unique identifier that could be used on all its materials.
- Issuing a news release in advance of Canadian Thanksgiving to help Canadians understand the



TITANIC SURVIVOR DIES

Mrs. Lilly Potter, 98, Was 'Grand Old Lady' of Red Cross Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 2---**Mrs. Lilly A. Wilson Potter**, *a descendant of the Mayflower Pilgrims* who was known as the "Grand Old Lady" of the Red Cross, died yesterday at her home. Her age was 98. She was a survivor of the Titanic disaster in 1912.

2012 marks the 100th anniversary of the Titanic's maiden voyage. 
Saturday morning, the meeting reconvened at the Yarmouth County Museum & Archives.
