- PROLIFIC FAMILY: John & Elizabeth Howland have enough descendants in 5 generations to fill four 500 pg. volumes in the 5 Generation Project.



"Well, here they come . . . Illegal aliens!"

- In 1640 Wampum was made legal tender. 8 white and 4 black beads were worth one penny. Also used as legal tender were corn, furs, wheat & rum.
- In 1643 John Smith was elected the town's cow keeper for the year at a salary of 40 bushels of corn and a pair of steers.
- In 1649 the Indian Chief, Massassoit, sold a 7 mile tract of land, renamed Duxbury, to Miles Standish. Samuel Nash and Constant Southworth. The three paid 7 coats, 9 hatchets, 8 hoes, 20 knives, 4 moose skins and 10½ yds. of cotton cloth.
- COURT FINES, 1655: Jonathan Coventry of Marshfield, for proposing marriage to Catharine Bradbury without her master's consent; Joanna, wife of O. Mosely, for beating her husband, getting her children to hit him on the head and wishing his food would choke him. She was punished at home; L. Ramsgate for lying, slandering and defaming her brotherin-law.
- In 1656 card playing became punishable by a fine of 50s.
- In 1658 the fine for profaning the Lord's Day by travelling or working was 20s or 4 hours in the stocks.

GENERAL SOCIETY NEWS

Board of Assistants Meeting at Newport, R.I.,

The Board of Assistants of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants met at the Sheridan Islander Hotel and Conference Centre, September 5, 6 & 7. Charged with administering the affairs of the Society between the trienniel meetings of the General Congress, the Board meets at various places on the invitation of the State Societies.

The Canadian Society was represented by the Deputy Governor General, the Rev. Melvin V. Donald, and the Assistant General, Mr. Marshall M. Dean.

The Rhode Island Society had made excellent arrangements for the comfort and entertainment of the delegates. They had arranged a sightseeing bus tour for the Friday afternoon, a reception in the Friday evening, and an artillery display and clam bake on the hotel grounds on Sunday. The banquet for delegates was on Saturday night.

The Governor General appointed Mr. Donald as Acting Elder General for the duration of the sessions because of the absence of the Elder General, and he carried out his duties with grace and dignity. This appointment not only brought recognition to Mr. Donald but to the Canadian Society itself.

The business meeting took place on Saturday. In the morning, reports of the General Officers and the various Committees were received. Of interest in the report of the Treasurer General was the section on the Mayflower House; the income from the endowment is fast approaching the stage where it will cover the expenses of the House without having to receive funds from the General Society; gifts to the capital of the endowment fund are therefore in order to ensure that the House will be completely self-sustaining. The Treasurer General also stated that he did not foresee any increase in the assessment upon State Societies in the immediate future.

In the afternoon resolutions were considered, debated and voted upon. One resolution of general interest was concerned with strengthening the policy with respect to the Historian General's office in order that the same rules be followed by successive Historian Generals and that they use the same criteria in assessing applications. An appeal board is to be established to which State Societies may take cases which are in dispute.

The General Congress is to meet at Plymouth in September of 1987. We trust that the Canadian Society will be able to arrange for full representation of delegates at that time.

HARRIS FAMILY REUNION

Thirty-seven members of the Harris family, founded in Nova Scotia in 1760 by Samuel and Sarah Harris, held a reunion in the Annapolis-Digby area of N.S. August 8-11, 1986. Samuel, who was a fifth-generation descendant of James Chilton, and Sarah, who was descended from Francis Cooke, both Mayflower passengers, came to the Annapolis area from Bridgewater, Mass. Their son Samuel married a daughter of Robert Jefferson, said to be a cousin of President Thomas Jefferson. Several Loyalist families later played a part in the family genealogy.

ISAAC ALLERTON

Isaac was born cl586, possibly London, parentage uncertain. His sister Sarah was married to Degory Priest who died the first winter; she arrived in Plymouth in 1623. Isaac married Mary Norris 4 Nov. 1611 in Leyden, Holland; she and their three children accompanied him on the Mayflower. After Mary's death 25 Feb. 1621 Isaac married in 1626 twenty year old Fear Brewster, daughter of Elder William Brewster. They had one son Isaac, Jr. before Fear's death 12 Dec. 1634. Isaac married a third time to Joanna () and died in 1659 in New Haven, Conn. Isaac had five (six?) children by his 1st wife, one by his 2nd wife:

THE MAYFLOWER COMPACT

INTHENAME OF GOD, AMEN. We whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread sovereign Lord King James, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain,

France and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, &c.

Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and advancement of the Christian faith, and honor of our King and Country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one of another, COVENANT and COMBINE ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation, and furtherance of ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions, and offices from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF we have here-under subscribed our names at Cape Cod 11 of November, in the year of the reign of our sovereign Lord King James, of England, France and Ireland 18, and of Scotland 54. Anno Domini 1620.

Written and signed in the Cabin of the Mayflower, on Cape Cod, Nov. 21, 1620 (Nov. 11, Old Style), as recorded by Governor William Bradford in his History of Plimoth Plantation.
