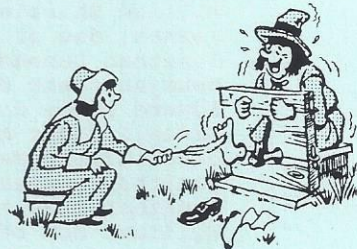

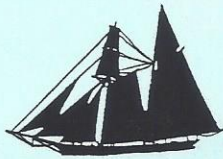
*** MEMBERSHIP DUES ***

HISTORIAN'S REPORT



Quite often we have relatives of present or previous members who wish to join the Society based on the previously approved lineage of said members. However, it is sometimes not that easy, which leaves the applicant wondering why he/she can't automatically "get in" when dad, grandpa or sister had been approved in the past. Let me explain...

From 1897 to the early 1980's, membership requirements in the General Society were lax and lineages were approved with very little documentation. During this time countless relatives were approved based on these undocumented papers until it became painfully obvious that some of these lineages contained errors. Around 1983, then Historian General, Barbara Merrick, began asking for full primary source documentation and you could no longer use a relative's previously approved lineage unless it was sufficiently documented. Many of us are affected by these upgraded rules & regulations. I myself joined the Society in 1981 - the date alone tells you that my paper may not be fully documented. I can tell you with certainty that it is not! I am presently gathering birth, marriage and death certificates with other primary docs so that I can bring my lineage up to today's standards.

So, if you write to me requesting membership for your daughter, grandson or nephew, don't be offended if I tell you that your relatives cannot automatically be approved because you were. Relatives can still join, but if your lineage is not fully documented, they will have to complete the documentation requirements first. If you have any questions, feel free to write.

THE GRAVE OF MYLES STANDISH



Capt. Myles Standish, Plymouth's long time military leader, died 3 Oct. 1656 - but where was the site of his burial? This question remained unanswered for 334 years! And, not only was the site finally discovered, but his actual remains as well. Sound morbid? Maybe. But the account is fascinating, read on...

In 1890, clergyman E.J. Huiginn, a recent arrival in Duxbury and a Pilgrim buff, began the search for Myles' final resting place. Through diligent research and the process of elimination, he located a grave in the center of an old burial ground on Chestnut St. in Duxbury. But the search was not yet over.

In his will dated 7 Mar. 1655, Myles requested to be buried "as neare as coneniently may bee" to his daughter Lora and daughter-in-law Mary. Imagine the astonishment when the area was exhumed. They found a young woman under 18 with fair hair and perfect teeth, an older well built man with red hair mixed with grey and a second young woman with "masses of glossy brown hair and beautiful teeth". Next to the second woman were the remains of two young boys, aged about nine and five.

With the known data available on the Standish family, these five were identified as follows:

1/ Daughter Lora Standish was born c1630/1 and was deceased by 1651 when she was not mentioned in Gov. Bradford's account of Myles' family ("...and hath 4 sons liveing, and some are dead"). If Lora is the fair haired woman under 18, then her death can be placed at pre 1648. 2/ Myles died in 1656 around 72 years of age. Accounts of his red hair were substantiated when his remains were found however, accounts of his small stature proved puzzling. The skeleton measured 5'7" which was not considered short in those days but this was explained by the bones being in a "crushed and disarticulated state". 3/ Daughter-in-law, Mary (Dingley) Standish was the wife of Myles' son, Josiah Standish. They were married 19 Dec. 1654 but the marriage was short as Mary died seven months later, 1 July 1655. 4/ & 5/ The two young boys were Charles & John Standish, sons of Myles. Charles was born c1624 but was deceased by c1634 when a son born was named Charles. John was born c1627 and was not accounted for in Bradford's statement in 1651. Therefore the facts show that one son died before the age of ten while the other died young at an unknown age and date. With the discovery of the boys' remains we now know that John too died as a young child and did not reach adulthood.



After the examinations of the remains were completed, a burial service was held and they were re-interred in new coffins. The memorial that present day visitors can view was erected in 1893 and would no doubt have pleased the Captain's military nature. The large square area is bordered by a short masonry wall which encloses boulders inscribed with the names of the deceased. At each corner stands a cannon or minion, with twelve cannon balls sitting on the pillars in between.

Although it took over 300 years, the area is a fitting tribute to the final resting place of Plymouth's first military leader.

Amos Humiston, who died in battle 1 July 1863. The account of his death made the headlines at the time and it is a very touching story. His body was found on the battle field, sitting against a stump clutching a picture of his three young children. As he was carrying no identification, the picture was published in an attempt to find his family and notify them of his death. Four months later his wife Philanda spotted the picture in a newspaper, ending the uncertainty of her husband's fate. What an interesting story!

REV. MELVIN DONALD (#4) and wife Lola of Willowdale, Ont. are celebrating their 50th Wedding Anniversary this fall! They were married 2 Oct. 1943 in Toronto, Ont. RE: LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

Treasurer Allyn Dean attended the meeting of the State Treasurers, chaired by Treasurer General, Eugene Fortine, which was held in Plymouth during the General Congress in September. It appears that each State Society is experiencing financial problems regarding their Life Membership fees. The Treasurer of the South Carolina Society distributed a study he carried out which clearly showed that the low fees presently charged are proving to be a financial drain on each Society. To remedy this situation, the State Societies have decided to either raise the fees considerably, or discontinue Life Memberships altogether.

The Canadian Society has very limited financial resources and if we are to continue to survive then we too must raise our Life Membership fees. Effective 31st Dec. 1993 we will have three rates as follows:

Age 0 - 45 -	\$800.00
Age 45 - 65 -	\$600.00
Age 65 + -	\$300.00

We would also like to remind our members that donations are very much appreciated. As with any organization, our Society needs the support of its members if it is to prosper and grow.

Your Canadian delegation has just returned from the General Congress of the General Society held in Plymouth, Mass. Sept. 11th-15h. Representing Canada were Leon Warmski as Deputy Governor General, Marshall Dean as Assistant General and delegates Susan Roser, Allyn Dean and Bob Cruikshank with our alternate delegate Margaret Owen.

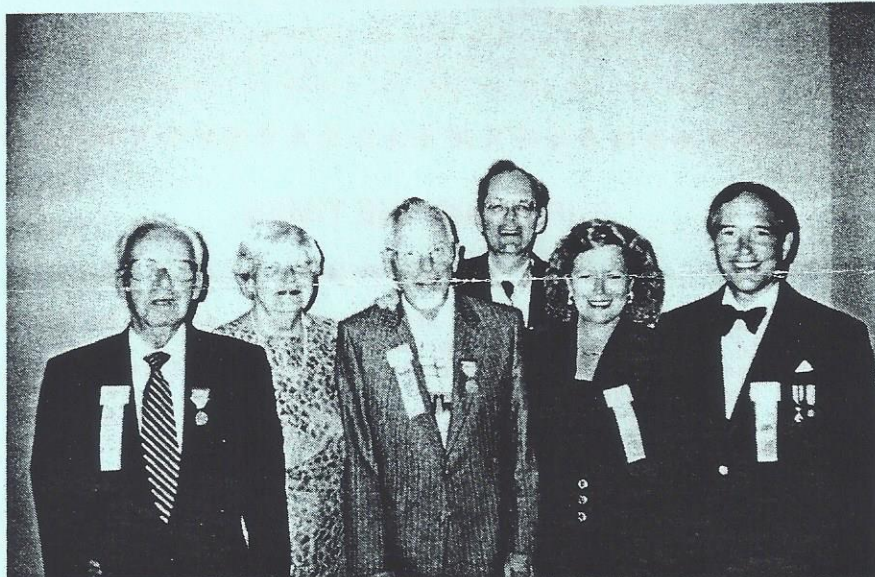
There were 363 delegates and members registered for the two day meetings held at the First Parish Church of Plymouth. Canada was among those State Societies who chose to give a short oral report to the delegation. We felt it was important that although many State reports are mailed to the Secretary General to be put on file, we in Canada should stand up and make ourselves known. (It is surprising how many members of the State Societies do not know that Canada has a society!) Our Governor, Leon Warmski rose to the occasion with a fine speech extending greetings from Canada and expressing our pleasure in attending the Congress.

Elections were carried out and we now have a new Governor General. While we appreciate the dedication shown to the Society by retiring Governor General, Miss Mildred Ramos, we are pleased to welcome as our new Governor General, Mr. Robert A. Greene of Rhode Island. The Canadian delegation had several opportunities to speak with Gov. General Greene; the General Society is indeed fortunate to have such a fine gentleman succeed such a lovely Southern lady!

The remaining nominees (as stated in the May Quarterly) were all unanimously elected - save one. There was a nomination from the floor for Eugene Fortine to be re-elected as Treasurer General - and he was.
