## Governor General to speak

We are pleased to have as our guest at the Spring Luncheon and Meeting governor general Maxwell.

The Rev. Richard Howland Maxwell was born in Medford, Massachusetts and educated in the Medford

Public Schools and Boston University, where he earned Bachelor of Arts and master of Divinity degrees.

In 1961, our governor general graduated from seminary, was ordained a Methodist minister, and married Marilyn Griffith of Plymouth. Over the next 20 years, Mr. Maxwell served pastorates in Fall River, East Bridgewater, and Falmouth, Massachusetts.

Since 1979, Mr. Maxwell has fulfilled his call-

ing to ministry as a member of a team to the Chiltonville Congregational Church in Plymouth. For the past ten years, he has operated a desktop publishing firm called PILGRIM TYPE AND DESIGN.

He is both a Trustee and a Fellow of Pilgrim Society, a Trustee at Large of Plimoth Plantation, and a member of Plymouth Historical Alliance, Plymouth Antiquarian Society, and the Pilgrim John Howland Society.

The Howland name in the governor general's family comes most directly through male descendants of Henry Howland, brother of John Howland of *The Mayflower*, but he has a line through his maternal great-grandmother to John Howland. He is a life member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants and has served as an elder, deputy governor, and governor. He joined in 1985 on a line from Richard Warren through Mary Warren Bartlett, and he also has lines to Francis Cooke, Francis Eaton, Edward Doty, and Stephen Hopkins.



Know your Board of Assistants— Susan Roser, Historian

Susan was born in Toronto, and has been a member of the Canadian Mayflower Society since 1981, a descendant of Isaac Allerton. She has been a Member at Large and Editor of *The Canadian Pilgrim*, from 1981 to 1997, producing 30 issues of our Newsletter over 15 years, with only a brief respite for one issue in 1996.

Susan has been our Historian since 1993, and those of you who have had your membership approved in the last few years will wonder at the remarkable efficiency by which your applications have been processed. As if this weren't enough, Susan is also our Assistant General for Canada of the General Society in Plymouth, and Internet contact for nine State Societies in the USA. In early 1998 she accepted an invitation by the Governor General to an appointment on The Computer Committee of the General Society.

Susan is also a prolific author. Since 1989 she has published five works: Mayflower Increasings; Mayflower Marriages; Mayflower Births and Deaths 2 vols; and Mayflower Deeds and Probates. She is currently working on her sixth book, presently untitled, dealing with selected families of Plymouth colonists who came to New England between 1621 and 1640. In April 1996 her article, "Harding-Merrick Notes: a Mayflower Line," appeared in the prestigious magazine, The American Genealogist (TAG). Her second article will appear in the same publication in 1998. It's called, "Which John<sup>4</sup> Cobb married Sarah<sup>5</sup> Bartlett? A Mayflower Line" which proposes "a more probable identification of the parentage of the husband of a Mayflower descendant, Sarah Bartlett, and corrects what has been published in the past."

Susan and her husband Hugh operate their own business. They have been married for twenty-six years, and have three children – Jason 25, Julie 22, and Jaimie 14. The family lives in the bucolic countryside near Milton, Ontario, with a beautiful view of the Escarpment from their front window.

We are very fortunate to have such an active and energetic member working on our behalf.

#### News from Nova Scotia by Marian L Worthen

MAYFLOWER BOY MAKES GOOD Remember the Fuller Brush Man? Indeed, who does not know the man who became famous not only for the quality of his brushes but for his innovative method of salesmanship. For some time now his name has been gone from our notice. And then, in the spring of 1997, it jumped back into prominence when his widow deeded their summer home and all its contents to the Yarmouth County Museum, Yarmouth, Nova Scotia.

ALFRED CHARLES FULLER WAS BORN in 1885 in Welsford in Nova Scotia's Annapolis Valley. The first Fuller — Edward Fuller— had come over on the Mayflower. One of his descendants had settled in Connecticut in 1696, later migrating to Nova Scotia. Perhaps the hardy genes of the Mayflower settler were reborn in Al Fuller. When he was 18, he went to Massachusetts to seek his fortune, and there he tied in with a small brush company. Knocking on doors by day and making his brushes in a basement by night, he would bring respectability to peddling, and turn a small brush company into a multi-million dollar operation.

IN 1932 HE MARRIED his second wife, Primrose Pelton of Yarmouth. In the 1960s they began to summer in the family home in Yarmouth at 20 Collins Street. It is a fine old house in the Queen Anne style and is furnished with eclectic pieces very much in keeping with the period. The piano is of special interest, and one room is given over to a display of brushes. Primrose was stricken with arthritis, and as a result there is a hoist chair built into the staircase. In the rear is a lovely rose garden.

IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO VISIT THE EAST COASt, put Yarmouth on your itinerary in order to see the "Fuller Brush House." It is well worth visiting. It is open daily during the summer only. Laura Bradley next door is available for genealogical consultation.



August Mayflower Quarterly By now you will have received your August 1997 Mayflower Quarterly, which arrived in mid-February. You may be wondering why that edition took so long to get to you. It seems that last August 224 copies were mailed to Canada, and none arrived. The problem apparently was due to incorrect labeling, and where all the copies ended up is an unexplained mystery. The Plymouth office had to send out a new 'Canadian' mailing to all members in Canada. We can only hope that the labeling problem is now resolved.

## The Millennium Project

ALL MAYFLOWER DESCENDANTS will be interested in this project!

The summer of 1997 saw the beginning of construction of the *Mayflower III*, as part of the U.K.'s Millennium celebration. The full size reconstruction of one of the most famous ships in history will take two years to build, and will then depart in the spring of 1999 for a goodwill voyage to the 'New World.'

The ship is being built at Chamber's Wharf on the Thames River, within sight of the Tower Bridge, and visitors to London will be able to watch its construction. After its voyage to the New World, the *Mayflower III* will become a permanent exhibit on the Thames and "will use the latest technology to depict life on board for both passengers and crew."

Mayflower III is being built by the same craftsmen who built the replica of the Mathew, John Cabot's ship that explored the eastern shores of Canada in the late 15th century. Readers may recall the visit of the Mathew to Newfoundland in the summer of 1997. The new ship will reflect the technology of the early 17th century.

YOU CAN BECOME A PART of the construction and voyage. Heliotrope International, the sponsors of this project, say they "are particularly keen to hear from Mayflower families in America. We will be attempting to compile a database of descendants for research purposes, and this will be available in the visitor centre and on the Internet. We would also like to know of places and sites with Pilgrim association in the United Kingdom, together with contact addresses, times of opening and any other useful information."









Above: Monument in London to Christopher Jones, Captain of the Mayflower.



## **Loves Sweet Revenge**

The New York Times reports this interesting story: Mayflower Wedding — 377 years later, nuptials give Miles Standish romantic revenge.

When bashful Mayflower captain Miles Standish sent his lieutenant John Alden to propose marriage to Priscilla Mullins, Standish got rejected and Alden won a wife. "Why don't you speak for yourself, John," was Priscilla's famous reply. At least that's the way it happened in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's 1858 poem, "The Courtship of Miles Standish," a fictional account based on three real people who stepped off the *Mayflower* in Plymouth, Mass, in 1620.

This weekend, Standish got a bit of romantic revenge when his descendant, Caroline Pillsbury, a 22 year old Columbia University student said "I do" to Andrew Oliver, descended directly from Priscilla and John.

Priscilla and John married and had 11 children after she rejected the marriage proposal of Standish, who went on to become a hero of the Plymouth Colony.

But the Olivers are living in the 1990s, not the 1620s. "The historical-literary connection is fun and interesting, but it was not the decisive factor in us getting together," Oliver, 27, told the Times "The decisive factor was love."

Although the families of the bride and groom knew both were Mayflower descendants, they did not make the Priscilla-Miles connection until a few weeks ago. "Other people think of these events as history and literature, but we think of them as family matters," said Andrew Oliver's father, Daniel Oliver.

The young bride and groom are at least fourteen generations removed from their famous ancestors, The Times said.

## Minutes of the Annual Banquet

The 17th Annual Meeting of the Canadian Society of Mayflower Descendants was held 15 November, 1997 at the Venture Inn in Burlington, Ontario, with forty-seven members and guests in attendance.

The meeting was called to order by Governor Bob Cruikshank who extended a warm welcome to all and offered a brief prayer.

Captain Paul Hill prefaced his reading of The Mayflower Compact with some background information on the arrival of our ancestors in the New World.

Minutes of the Last Meeting: Mr.Cruikshank asked for a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting. This motion was passed.

Reports:

Historian's Report: Mrs. Susan Roser reported that we have 18 new members to date this year. Last fall we started a membership drive in honour of the General Society's 100th Anniversary in 1997. Since we began our drive, 28 new members have been admitted. Letters of appreciation and gifts were mailed to distant recipients, while Mrs. Roser made personal presentations to Mrs. Lois Stephens, Mr. George Crawford, Mrs. Joyce Cutler and Mrs. Myrna Geldart. In the four years that Mrs. Roser has been Historian, 115 new members have been added to our Society. We now have a web page on the Internet and are listed on the site of the General Society as well as on several other sites. Our Colonies in Alberta and British Columbia are strong and active, with regular fall meetings. We now have enough members in the three Maritime Provinces combined to form a new Maritime Colony. This avenue will be pursued with our down-east members.

We should receive four issues of the *Mayflower Quarterly* and two issues of our newsletter, the *Canadian Pilgrim*, each year. Mrs. Roser asked that we inform our Secretary, Ms Deborah Clarke, if we are missing any so that she can contact the appropriate person. Several members have not received their August issues of the *Quarterly*.

It recently was learned that past Board Member and Editor Mrs. Betty Field had suffered a devastating aneurysm in August. After five or six surgeries, Mrs. Field is on the road to recovery. Also, member Mrs. Barbara Clarke, mother of Recording Secretary Debbie Clarke, has been in hospital since last December. She expects to be going home soon.

**Editor's Report**: Mr. Dale Lahey, the new Editor of the *Canadian Pilgrim*, stated that his first (April) issue will have a somewhat different format, with more pictures and, perhaps, biographies. Mr. Lahey thanked Mrs. Roser for her 15 years as Editor of 30 newsletters.

**Librarian's Report**: Mr. Bill Hosking informed us that all books not directly related to Mayflower genealogy have been removed from the CSMD Collection at the North York Cen-

tral Library. These books will be offered for sale to our members. A. Dean and Mrs. Roser are currently storing these books for us. Mr. Hosking is in the process of putting out a new catalogue of what is left in our holdings.

**Public Relations Report**: Mr. Paul Hill said that he has tried several ways to attract new members to our Society. Newspaper notices initially were somewhat successful, but no longer seem to be productive. Encouraging members to bring in relatives is one of the best ways, as our current membership drive has proved. Next year Mr. Hill hopes to contact other genealogical societies and offer to provide them with a speaker. This should introduce us to many prospective new members.

**Treasurer's Report**: Mr. Allyn Dean reported that we now have member #275. We have 71 Life, and 135 Regular members, giving us a total of 206 members. Sixty-nine have left for various reasons. We have 37 members in Alberta, 21 in British Columbia and 17 in the three Maritime Provinces. The Constitution says that if 15 members in good standing wish to form a Colony they may petition the Board of Assistants to do so. At present there is \$2205.59 in our savings account, \$797.89 in our chequing account, and \$595.26 in our U.S. monies account.

On a motion by Mr. Marshall Dean, seconded by Mrs. Roser, the Treasurer's Report was approved.

**Other Business**: The Spring Luncheon will be held at the Old Mill in Toronto 30 May, 1998 when the Governor General will be the guest speaker. Brochures are available.

**Necrology**: Mr. A. Dean read the Necrology: Mr. T. Lincoln Rice of Guelph, Ontario, (#76) died 8 April, 1997.

Nominating Committee Report: The new slate of officers for 1998-2000 was presented by the Chairman, Mr. A. Dean. They are: Governor - Mr. Paul Hill, Deputy Governor - Mr. Marshall Dean, Elder - The Rev. Mel Donald, Treasurer - Mr. Allyn Dean, Captain - Mr. Bill Hosking, (who will complete Mr. Hill's term in that office) and Members-at-Large - Mrs. Joyce Cutler and Mrs. Myrna Geldart.

**Election of Officers**: The above officers were elected by acclamation.

This concluded the business part of the meeting.

Deputy Governor Dean proposed a toast to the Queen of Canada and Governor Cruikshank said grace. A delicious turkey dinner was served.

After dinner Mr. Cruikshank introduced our guest speaker, The Rev. Mr. Morris Russell. The subject of his address was "Spiritual Pilgrimage". Mr. Hill thanked our guest and presented him with a copy of the Bradford book, *Of Plymouth Plantation*, *1620-1647*. In closing, Mr. Hill invited everyone to attend the Spring Tea in May.

The meeting adjourned at 3:40 p.m.
