The Governor General's message

Since assuming the office of Governor General in 1999, Eugene A. Fortine has taken a special interest in the internationalization of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Over some resistance he has succeeded in bringing forward four amendments for consideration at the upcoming General Congress which will, if accepted, go a long way to meeting the concerns of those Society members who are not citizens of the United States. We are fortunate to have a concerned and able spokesman in Governor General Fortine working on our behalf. We wish him well and full success in this important step for the well-being of the Society. GG Fortine has prepared an overview of the problem, which is printed in full below. The four amendments are outlined in Canadian Governor Susan Roser's report in the minutes of the Fall banquet on page ten.

Greetings to my Canadian cousins: In 1980, the General Society of Mayflower Descendants thought it good to charter a society in Canada. Governor General E. Frederick Low and Membership Chairman Robert Thurtle contacted Rev. James McGivern of Canada advising him there were 77 General Society members living in Canada, and asked if he would be interested in forming a Canadian Society. On 13 September, 1980, the Canadian Society of Mayflower Descendants was chartered. The General Society suddenly became an international organization.

One of the requirements of a chartered society is conformance to the Constitution and ByLaws of the General Society. These documents contained requirements that were awkward, at best, for our Canadian members. For example, when displaying the Mayflower flag, it was required that the flag of the United States be also displayed. This made sense for state societies within the United States, but difficult for the Canadian Society. Yet they had to conform to this.

Early on, some concessions were made. The flag of Canada would be displayed with the flag of the United States and, with the Mayflower flag. Canadian members need not sing the National Anthem of the United States at General Congress. But, patriotic language still remained in our documents.


In 1990 the Canadian Society proposed some changes to the Constitution and ByLaws of the General Society. Most of these were withdrawn at the request of the Counsellor General. One proposed amendment was presented at Congress and approved.

In 1993, Marshall Dean again tried to accomplish changes at General Congress. Dean later wrote that his amendments "failed to pass." This issue again came up in 1999, but because of procedural problems most of the proposed amendments never reached the floor, except for one which was approved.

When elected in 1999, this governor general felt it was time to make a few changes in our documents to accommodate our Canadian cousins and any future society that might be chartered in another country. Some minor changes would accomplish this objective. I asked the leadership of the Canadian Society to hold off submitting proposed changes because that process had not worked well in the past. I believed these changes could be accomplished by discussing them within the Executive Committee, then sending the proposals to the General Board of Assistants with a recommendation of approval, after which they would come before General Congress for a final vote in 2002. We are now on that road.

What surprised me was the resistance that occurred to changing our Constitution and Bylaws. Even some on my Executive Committee resisted change. There seems to be a feeling that the Society of Mayflower Descendants is a patriotic organization, patriotic to the United States. Any changes making our Constitution and ByLaws more acceptable to Canadians is perceived as taking patriotism out of our Society. We all acknowledge that the Mayflower Compact was the earliest document on this continent proposing government by the governed, a radical idea at the time, and an early model for the Constitution of the United States. We know the Pilgrims helped steer the future United States in directions we now cherish. There is no reason to take patriotism out of our Society and I do not advocate so doing. A few insignificant amendments will not remove patriotism.

General Congress this September will vote on these changes. Of the sixteen or so proposed changes, only four deal with this issue. It is my hope that the majority at Congress will agree with these proposed changes. I strongly support them. —Eugene A. Fortine, Governor General.



How history turns A document from 1601 notes that a wounded English soldier listed as "Myls Stansen" was brought to the hospital from the siege of the town of Oostende in the southern Netherlands (now in Belgium). Between 1601 and 1604 Oostende heroically resisted a Spanish siege in which 72,000 people were killed, the town surrendering only after it had been reduced to ruins. The hastily scrawled hospital entry places Myles Standish among the many English soldiers garrisoned in Leiden, aiding the Dutch in their war for independence from Spain (which did not officially come until 1648). Standish met and became friends with Rev. John Robinson in Leiden.

Seventeen percent of African Americans who responded said they believed they are Mayflower descendants. Although the original Pilgrims were all Protestants, 21 percent of Catholics who responded believe they have pilgrim blood.

We're the good guys When asked about the difference between Puritans and Pilgrims, former Governor Richard Maxwell answered that the Pilgrims "tended to be more tolerant because they had lived among the Dutch and had suffered so much for their faith."

An Elder for all time: The Encyclopedia Britannica sums up Elder William Brewster's position in Plymouth: "Brewster, the only university-trained member of the Plymouth community, was the real leader of the church. As its senior elder he dominated the formulation of its doctrines, worship, and practices. He was not a magistrate, but by virtue of his close association with the governor, William Bradford, he played a major role in civil as well as religious affairs."



The Mayflower Compact was read by Dale Lahey.

Ancestral Roll Call read by the Recording Secretary Deborah Clarke. William Brewster's family was the most highly represented at 11 descendants, followed by Stephen Hopkins family at 5. In all there were descendants from 17 Mayflower passengers

Necrology read by Allyn Dean. Three members died during the last year. Mrs. Jean Arthurs, Raymond Hadden, and George Lydiard, an original founding member of the B.C. colony. From 1995-98 George Lydiard was Regent of the B.C. colony and in 1994-95 he served as Vice Regent. We have learned just recently of the deaths of two other members, Elizabeth Watson died in 1999 and Mary McFeely died in 1997.

Treasurer's Report by Allyn Dean. As of 9 November 2001 our latest member number stood at 355 which includes 68 life members, 182 regular members and 105 who are no longer members making a total of 250 members. Of the Regular Members 15 have paid for 2000; 116 have paid for 2001; 42 have paid for 2002 and 9 have paid for 2003. Bank Accounts: 543-500579 - \$13170.17; 543-7200005 \$US - \$935.13. Historian's Report by Susan Roser. We have 13 new members so far this year but Susan is confident that number will increase to 15 by the end of the year. Although down from previous years, the number of applicants remain high. What is most promising for the future of our society is that there has been an increase in the number of younger applicants. Susan went on to say that the job of historian has become extremely time consuming and that sometime in the future we may need an Assistant Historian.

Mayflower license plate is being designed as well. The Elder General is compiling a prayer book suitable for society functions. A Pilgrim sites booklet is being planned and a plaque to Dr. Samuel Fuller will be unveiled in Middleboro in 2002. \$2000 has been allotted for a DNA project testing male lines. However the really big news is that the society is considering buying Scrooby Manor, the former English home of William Brewster. A member in Illinois has offered to provide the funds for the purchase.

Proposed Changes to the General Society Constitution. There is an ardent desire in the General Society to make the Society more international. Consequently the following are proposed: removal of the words "American Freedom;" removal of the reference to the armed forces in the US; removal of the need for state societies to display an American Flag with the General Society flag; after the first use of the word "state" as in State Society, the words, "includes Country, Province, etc.," will be inserted.
