## A History of Plymouth Rock

December 10, 1620: The Pilgrims sail from Cape Cod and go ashore on Clark's Island in Plymouth Harbor where they build fires to wash and warm themselves, and hold a Sabbath service at "Pulpit Rock." They name the island for the first mate of the Mayflower.

December 11, 1620: Setting out for the mainland in the shallop, the settlers go ashore upon a large boulder located north of the mouth of Town Brook. The rock quickly becomes a valued landing place because it is covered by water only during high spring tides. A century later, the town builds it's first wharf right over the rock.

1741: Thomas Faunce, a 95-year old elder of the Plymouth Church and descendant of one of the original settlers, identifies the rock based on information handed on to him through his family.

1774: Forefather's Rock, as it became known, is valued as a symbol of liberty in this Revolutionary period and it is decided to move the rock to Town Square where the Liberty Pole stood. Using a yoke of oxen to lift the rock from it's bed at water's edge, workmen accidentally split the rock in two and only the upper half is brought to Town Square.

1834: Observing the intense interest of souvenir hunters, the town officials decide to protect the rock by moving it from Town Square to an iron-fenced enclosure at Pilgrim Hall Museum.

1859: The Pilgrim Society acquires a waterfront site and moves the lower part of the rock there.

1860: Designer Hammatt Billings erects an Italian-style canopy at the waterfront site.

1880: The Pilgrim society brings the two halves of the rock together at the waterfront site and rejoins the rock with cement. Later, the rock is engraved with the date 1620.

1920: The old canopy is replaced by the current Greek Classical canopy, paid for the Colonial Dames.

- "The war that never was" -  
On Sunday March 30, 1741 the town was alarmed during service by Joseph Wampum, a native who resided four miles from Buzzard's Bay. His news that 8 Spaniards had landed at his house was met with much panic since war existed between England and Spain. The drums proceeded to beat, the militia was sent out, but it proved a false alarm. It was afterwards called "Wampum's War".

- Mary Chilton is buried with her husband John Winslow in King's Chapel Burying Ground, Boston, - next to the grave of Paul Revere.

- The Winslow House, home of the Mayflower Society in Plymouth, was built on land owned by the Howlands for over 100 yrs. John Howland's son Capt. Jos. Howland, the first owner, passed the land on to his son Capt. Thomas Howland and he to his son Consider. Ownership changed to the Winslows in 1754 when Edw. Winslow, husband of Consider's sister Hannah, bought the land.

- Recipe for Insomnia - "Bruise a handful of Anis-seeds, and steep them in Red Rose Water, and make it up in little bags, and binde one of them to each Nostrill, and it will cause sleep."

- According to Plymouth law, an Indian arrested for being drunk had to volunteer six days of labour.

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## FROM THE GOVERNOR

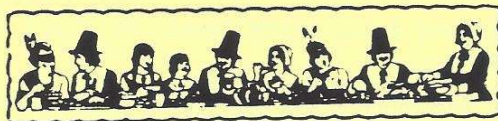
## ANNUAL MEETING & FALL BANQUET REPORT

The 6th Annual Fall Meeting & Compact Dinner was held at the Delta Chelsea Inn in Toronto, Nov. 14th, 1987, with 41 members and friends present.

The agenda for the evening was as follows:

Treasurer Margaret Owen greeted guests at the door and presented them with name tags and membership cards for those who were paying their dues. Following the cocktail hour, Gov. Mel Donald welcomed everyone to the dinner with special mention to those who came from "way out-of-town". We had the Deans from Oshawa the Watsons from Ottawa and all the way from Thunder Bay, Ont. to attend their first meeting were Mr. & Mrs. Leslie Harris.

The singing of the National Anthem was followed by a toast to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II led by Dep. Gov. Marshall Dean. As is the tradition at each banquet, the Mayflower Compact was read, this year by Captain Keith Bain; and describing Plymouth's first three hungry years, Editor Susan Roser explained the significance of the symbolic five kernels of corn at each plate. Elder Ruth Ferguson read the grace and a very enjoyable turkey dinner followed.



Elections were held and the results as follows: Governor - Mel Donald; Secretary - Deborah Clarke; Captain - Arthur Harris; Member-at-large - Leon Warmski. Past Captain Keith Bain remains a member of the Board as do all members holding office.

The Ancestral Roll Call was read by Secretary Deborah Clarke. Unfortunately we did not count hands to see which Pilgrim was in the lead with the highest representation!

Dep. Gov. Marshall Dean reported on the Congress held in Plymouth last September. Next year's Congress will be held in Bloomington, Delaware.

Historian Kate Berscht introduced our guest speaker (and fellow member) Joan Magee, B.A., M.L.S. who spoke on "Huguenots on the Mayflower". Miss Magee is a Reference Librarian at the University of Windsor and as was apparent to her audience, is an authority on the subject. We learned that a Huguenot was a 16th or 17th century French speaking Protestant and three out of four English names can be traced back to Huguenot names. Early Plymouth names which fall into this category include Soule, Tilley, Samson, Cooper, Mullins, Delano, Simmons, Bumpas and Cuthbertson. Response to the speaker and the presentation of a gift in appreciation was made by member Leon Warmski.

Further announcements made by Gov. Donald - Regarding membership, we had six new members in 1987 with seven new approved members who will join Jan. 1st. We were saddened to hear of the death of our oldest member Mr. Clyde Soule in Sept. 1987. Mr. Soule attended many of our past meetings. We also learned of the tragic death of Len and Jean Decker's daughter Carol in an automobile accident in the fall. Len has served as Counsellor on our Board of Assistants this past year but has recently been transferred back to the States. We extend our deepest sympathy to these families.

The Banquet came to an end with the singing of the Royal Anthem.

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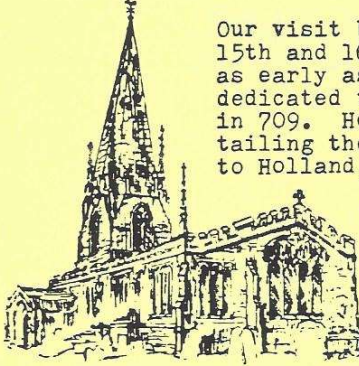


WHERE OUR STORY BEGAN

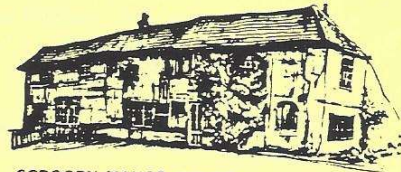
Last September my wife Jean and I visited the village of Scrooby, about 35 miles north of Nottingham, in England. A settlement existed here as early as 958 AD and the Domesday Survey of 1086 records "Scrobi" as a portion of the manor of Sutton-cum-Lound; but the village's great claim to fame is through its link with the Pilgrims and especially with William Brewster who lived here.



ST. WILFRID'S CHURCH

Our visit began at St. Wilfrid's Church, which was built in the 15th and 16th centuries, though a church of this name stood here as early as 1177. This is the Anglican parish church and is dedicated to St. Wilfrid, an early Archbishop of York who died in 709. Here a very friendly guide showed us large posters detailing the story of the Pilgrim Separatist Church, the Flight to Holland, the life of William Brewster and a description of the manor house where he lived, and the Mayflower list of passengers. There was also a brass plaque commemorating a visit by a delegation from the Mayflower Society in "Plymouth, New England" in 1955. This church receives many visitors who are Mayflower descendants and parishoners are proud of their historic connections. Our guide told us that the previous year he and a friend had retraced in their own boat the voyage of the Pilgrims to Holland.

We then walked up a rather muddy country lane to the Manor House, where a building has stood for at least as far back as 1207. Many famous people have stayed here, including King John (before he signed the Magna Carta); Margaret, daughter of Henry VII, on her way to marry King James IV of Scotland; Cardinal Wolsey and Henry VIII. In 1606-7 William Brewster held meetings of the Scrooby Separatist Church here. The principal members of the Church besides Brewster (ruling elder) were Richard Clyfton (pastor), John Robinson (teacher) and a youthful member, William Bradford. In 1607 the Church's activities became known to the Established Church authorities and the group decided to leave for Holland. They were successful on the second attempt in 1608, but the story of these escapes is a tale in itself.



SCROOBY MANOR HOUSE

On the Manor House is a plaque to William Brewster and one, unveiled in 1920 by representatives of the "Anglo-American Society", commemorates the 300th anniversary of the Mayflower voyage to America.

A few miles from Scrooby we had dinner at Blyth, the home village of Francis Cooke. Later in our trip we spent a night in Canterbury, the home of James Chilton. Here we visited St. Paul's Church, in whose parish resided James and his father Lyonell Chylton. James' daughter Mary was baptized in 1607 in nearby Sandwich, where the family lived from 1600 until they moved to Holland.

We ended our trip in London, from where we had intended to see the (probable) Mayflower timbers in the old barn at Jordans, near Beaconsfield. However, the rain poured down on the only available days, thwarting our plans. On our next UK trip this visit will have a high priority.
